Making the most of Collaborative Planning is relevant for parents, teachers and school leaders. It can be run as either a full or half day workshop. Depending on your

requirements the workshop can be customised specifically for parents or schools; or for parents and schools combined.

This interactive workshop explores the dynamic relationships between students, parents and teachers and the importance of authentic collaboration in planning for a quality education.

The following questions provide the structure of the workshop:

- What is collaborative planning and why is it helpful?
- Why is it important?
- Who can be involved in the collaborative planning process?
- When and how does collaborative planning happen?

Throughout the workshop there will be opportunities for you to share your own experiences; discuss roles, responsibilities and rights; view and respond to scenarios; and try out a range of communication strategies that will either complement or challenge you (the choice will be yours). By the end of the workshop you will be equipped with:

- Knowledge of your rights and responsibilities as part of the collaborative planning process.
- Research that supports the benefits of collaborative planning between students, parents and schools.
- Effective communication strategies promote authentic collaboration.
